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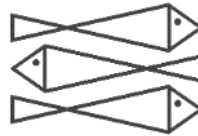

A lonely boy accidentally awakens an unhinged, eldritch sea god in this unsettling YA horror from New York Times-bestselling author CG Drews.

The only thing Jonathan Covey wants from the gloomy, moldering isle of Kelcarrow is to leave it. Summer is ending, and his friends are looking forward to college on the mainland, unaware that Jonathan was not accepted to join them. He'll be left behind with nothing but the ocean's haunts and a rising dread of being abandoned.

In an act of wild desperation, Jonathan pays a tithe to Scorpion Deep, an eldritch sea god who many of the locals have dismissed as myth. He wants to forget the past, he wants to follow his friends, and most of all he wants to finally escape.

To his shock and horror, the ritual works—Scorpion Deep awakens. And despite his terror, Jonathan can't help but feel drawn toward the ageless entity that seems just as mutually obsessed with him. As scales start growing down his spine and Scorpion Deep's adoration of him turns bloody, Jonathan realizes the only way to end the nightmare is to destroy the monster one way or another.

But once a god has awoken, the only way to be free is to pay a price of blood.



WHEN SHADOWS BURN by Vanessa Le

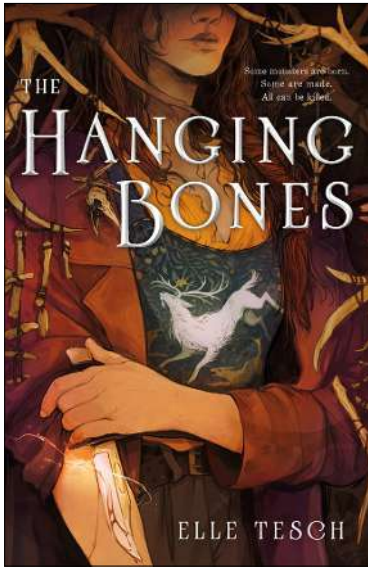
Vanessa Le's YA/adult crossover fantasy duology follows a demon-hunting duo in a city filled with magic, murder, and corruption—perfect for fans of *Babel* and *Divine Rivals*.

In the city of Yennington, exorcism hinges on two components: a demon caller, and a demon slayer. Kiet Sren is a star-studded caller; even though he dropped out of university early, his blood attracts any demon. Song Sarna is the top slayer of her class; her blade and wit kills any demon. Together, they run the Inkspill Agency.

When one evening they respond to a possession caused by an aberrant demon, they are propelled into the most dangerous hunt of their lives—an investigation that could uncover the workings of a shrouded group seeking to destroy the university from the inside out.

But as long-buried secrets begin to rise to the surface, they will discover that this underground organization is closer to home than they realized. And that perhaps their upstanding exorcist school is hiding secrets of its own. To take down the aberrant demon and put an end to the targeted possessions, they will need to put not just their blood and blades—but their hearts—on the line.

Vanessa Le's new fantasy duology combines dark academia with a propulsive detective tale at its finest—with a hair-tugging romance and biology-based magic system as intricate as lab work.



THE HANGING BONES by Elle Tesch

In this YA fantasy, a resourceful girl enters the hunt for a legendary stag in a desperate attempt to win the death of her lecherous overlord.

Once every few years, the Scavenge Moon rises. From beyond its pale glow steps the Breimar Stag, an otherworldly creature with eyes of burning gold. Any reckless adventurer who chooses to join the hunt for the stag only has until the Scavenge Moon sets to claim their prize—if they catch it, they are granted the death of any person of their choice. And if no one catches it, the stag will claim one of the hunters' souls instead.

Katrin has lived on the border of the forest her whole life, raised on tales of the Folk that dwell within. As a gamekeeper for the baron who rules over the region, she is saddled with the onerous task of escorting the entitled nobles who descend upon her home for the Breimar Hunt. None of them respect the forest or its legends, and Katrin is only too happy to let them risk their foolish necks for what they see as a cheap thrill.

When her beloved cousin becomes the latest target of the baron's lecherous appetites, Katrin knows only his death will keep her family safe, and the only way she can claim his life is to win the hunt herself. But something hungry has begun to stir in the woods, something even older and more powerful than the stag. As the horrifying, mutilated bodies pile up, Katrin begins to question where the true danger lies.



ALL WE HUNGER FOR by Anna Mercier

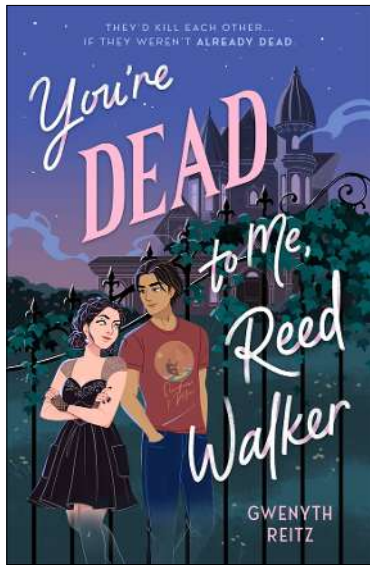

In this YA romantasy for fans of *A Magic Steeped in Poison*, a young woman sneaks her way into a magical baking contest in the hopes of escaping the slums, but gets pulled into an elusive aristocrat's lavish world and his nefarious plan as rebellion brews.

In Anespérer, where magic comes alive through artistic skill, Elara knows she'll never be selected for the Objet d'Art. The high-stakes baking competition will elect a new Souverain to join the council who run Anespérer, and someone from the slums would never be considered. But when a brooding figure from her past sneaks her in, Elara has the chance to compete for a better future—as long as no one uncovers her secret.

Nikolas Dupont will do whatever it takes to impress his powerful father, a Souverain who hasn't officially recognized his son—like handpick a contestant to win and become his father's political pawn. But Elara is more than he bargained for.

Against all odds, Elara excels and becomes a hero to the city's poor—all while Nik's faith in his father crumbles and his infatuation with Elara burns brighter. As the competition's explosive final round approaches, Elara and Nik must choose: fight to win the competition and secure a future of safety for them both, or use the power of Elara's art to spark a revolution.

Gwennyth Reitz's swoonworthy YA debut is a supernatural romcom with the academic rivalry of *Never Have I Ever*, the afterlife limbo of *Boo, Bitch*, and the irresistible romance of *The Upside of Falling*.

They'd kill each other. . . if they weren't already dead.

Tessa Sinclair is a winner. Winner of spelling bees, science fairs, and scholarships. So when she finds herself unexpectedly dead at an abandoned mansion graduation party, she's none too pleased. What's worse, her Harvard-bound, Mr. Perfect academic rival Reed Walker seems to be stuck in afterlife limbo with her.

Being a ghost is hard enough, but it's a thousand times worse being forced to haunt the same house with your archenemy. But as Tessa and Reed try to R.I.P. in their respective corners of the mansion, a mystery begins to unfurl about the exact cause of their deaths. Though they'd rather die (again) than work together, they'll need to find a way to overcome their differences to hunt down a murderer on the loose. And should they happen to fall for each other along the way. . . Who ever said you can't find love after death?



CURSED EVER AFTER by Andy C. Naranjo

A high-stakes, Latinx subverted fairytale brimming with snark and banter-filled romance perfect for fans of *The Princess Bride* and *Once Upon a Broken Heart*.

Risa Porto is a Bad Thing born on a Bad Day and cursed with Bad Luck.

After years of taking the blame for every calamity, mishap, and minor inconvenience that befalls the townspeople of Barrow, she longs for escape. And on her seventeenth birthday, her wish is granted.

Sort of.

Risa owes a (very annoying) witch a favor, and it comes in the form of a quest: escort Prince Javi—the youngest, handsomest, and *least significant* prince—through the dark (and deadly) Woods to his wedding. This measly errand quickly spirals into a struggle against greedy assassins, a murderous cult, a vicious tyrant—and Risa's own curse.

Most unfortunate of all. . .

She is not immune to Javi's charms and has a highly irritating urge to kiss the prince. Though, surviving the darkest corners of the Woods is only the beginning. If Risa is to hold up her end of a witch's bargain, she'll need a lot more than luck on her side to untangle the web of lies threatening the kingdom. Is Risa willing to pay the price of happily ever after? What if the only person she's meant to save is herself?

TAKE IT TO YOUR GRAVE

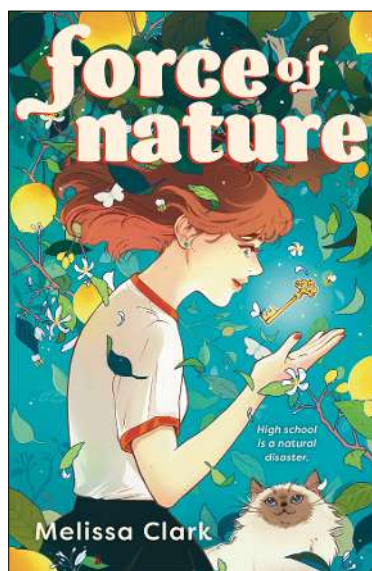

Maximiliano Rafael Guerrero Lopez “Max” has been dead for 30 years, stuck as a sixteen year old in his childhood bedroom reliving a constant loop of his final minutes.

Joaquín Felix Ladrón “Joaquín” is a high schooler who's desperate to experience something paranormal, so much so that he's alienated Marte—his ex-boyfriend—in his single-minded pursuit. When Joaquín goes on a ghost hunt with his best friends at an abandoned house that's rumored to be haunted, he and Max find their fates intertwining in a way that may just prove to be fatal. . . With its fast pace and dual POV, this is a nail-bitingly gripping story certain to leave you on the edge of your seat until the very last page.



FORCE OF NATURE by Melissa Clark

This fresh, smart, and funny young adult debut with a speculative twist asks the question: What if Mother Nature was a teenage girl?

Who is Chloe Lovejoy, really? A straight-C student, a girl with a crush on the cutie from chorus, an all-powerful being responsible for taking care of the planet. . . or perhaps all three. That's what Chloe finds out on her sixteenth birthday, when she unexpectedly inherits the role of Mother Nature from her grandmother. Chloe is overwhelmed, to say the least. Then, when the unthinkable happens, and Grandma is no longer around to guide her, Chloe is left to oversee the natural laws of the world all by herself.

Between managing earthquakes and hurricanes, rivals at school, and her not-very-helpful mother, Chloe tries to maintain balance and harmony on Earth and in her everyday life. But someone in the community has an eye toward harnessing her powers for nefarious purposes, which means Chloe needs to dig deep and get her act together before her secret is found out. After all, the universe is depending on her.

Force of Nature by Melissa Clark is an utterly unique coming of age story about a teen girl rising to the occasion, even when she feels completely in over her head.

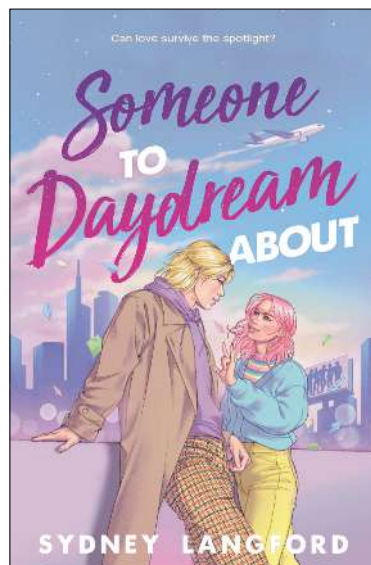

At least, that's the plan.

Instead, Enzo finds himself at the airport face-to-face with Garrett: a confident, handsome football jock from the *wrong* Georgia—the one with peaches, not violins. Somewhere, something got seriously lost in translation.

While Garrett quickly charms everyone in Irontown with his easygoing Southern swagger, Enzo is . . . less enthused. For fans of Rachel Lynn Solomon and Alice Oseman, this swoony, fast-paced YA romance stars a Deaf, demiromantic teen who falls in love with the lead singer of the world's most popular boy band during a whirlwind summer tour.

Every teenager knows eighteen-year-old Felix Hwang, the lead singer of the most popular boy band since One Direction. *Unfortunately*, Natalie Nielsen is no exception—though she thinks of him more as an annoying rich kid from her hometown than a heartthrob.

Uninterested in stardom, Natalie dreams of honoring her late dad's legacy and making a positive impact on her beloved Deaf community by revamping her family's run-down Deaf Center. The issue? She has no money. When Felix's little sister's hearing loss begins to accelerate, he gives Natalie a generous job offer that would help secure the Center's future: but she must accompany him on tour this summer to teach him sign language.

What begins as a professional arrangement soon morphs into stolen kisses and late-night rendezvous. But as their connection deepens, so do the risks—and when their relationship suddenly takes center stage, it's not only their hearts, but Felix's career on the line.

Between relentless public scrutiny, contractual obligations, and meddling band members, Natalie must decide if their dreams can co-exist in the spotlight.

A chilling speculative YA about a white teenaged boy who is haunted by the victims of a Black town erased from history and is recruited by the restless souls left behind to bring them justice.

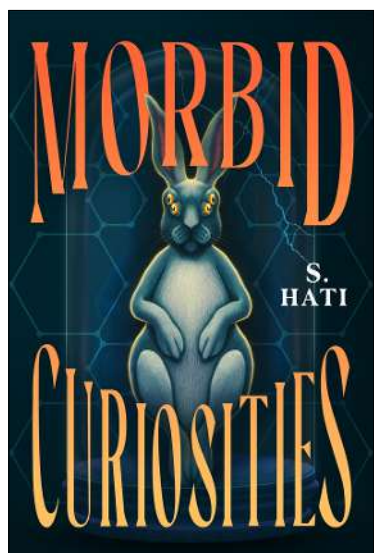
When Sidney Cromwell moves to rural Forsyth County, Georgia from the big city of Atlanta, all he wants is to fit in at his new high school. But when Sidney nearly drowns in Lake Lanier, an allegedly haunted lake that is the site of numerous inexplicable freak accidents and deaths, he becomes a social pariah as he starts to suffer terrifying visions from the past and hauntings by apparitions calling him to Lanier.

Sidney returns to the lake for answers, and he finds in its murky depths the spirits of former residents from Oscarville, the Black town that lies beneath the man-made lake. They enlist Sidney to remind Forsyth of its devastating history and push its citizens to make amends so that the souls in Oscarville can finally rest.

But Sidney soon learns that people will go to great lengths to avoid facing truths they'd rather not hear. The people of Forsyth County refuse to acknowledge the past, and as Oscarville's populace starts to lose their patience, their rage and thirst for vengeance rise like a tidal wave.

An ambitious teen enrolls at an elite science institute in *Morbid Curiosities*, a young adult thriller novel from author S. Hati.

When the Institute's invitation arrived at my doorstep, it felt like it had been inked in my blood, sweat, and tears.

Aarya's life plan has been set for as long as she can remember: finish high school with a bang, attend the best college she can get into, then land a prestigious biology research job. Her ticket to this dream is a one-year program at the Elizabethan Institute, the preeminent organization for life sciences in the United States, currently on the cusp of revealing a major project that could transform the worlds of biology and medicine.

But as Aarya tries to settle in to a school with sky-high academic expectations and research cloaked in mystery, it becomes clear that someone doesn't want her there. As the scholarship student surrounded by rich, cutthroat peers who seem all too willing to torment her, she never expected to make friends, but the notes warning her to run rattle her to her core. She finds an ally in Sofia, a mysterious girl who claims to be the subject of closed-door experiments at the Institute and begs for Aarya's help in figuring out what the Institute is really working on.

As rumors of mutated flora and fauna in the nearby city circulate and a murder investigation rocks the Institute, Aarya will have to navigate Sofia's growing paranoia and her own increasingly unreliable memory to determine which classmates she can trust—and which would rather see her dead.



***SHE DRINKS THE LIGHT* by Yasmin Angoe**

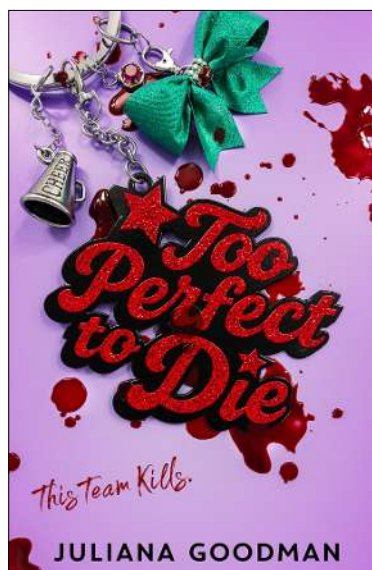

Ada has spent her whole life on the Golden Isle, a private island off the coast of South Carolina. Citizens of the Isle don't really fraternize with mainlanders, and for good reason. Some of the islanders, like Ada and her Nana Ama, have secrets that need to be protected. They are Adze, supernatural beings that drink human blood in order to survive.

But when her best friend Naria goes missing after getting involved with a shadowy organization called the Endowment, Ada is forced to go to the mainland to try and find her. Once there, she finds herself drawn to Hailey, the head of the Endowment's niece. But as Ada gets closer to finding Naria, she uncovers secrets about Nana Ama's past. . . secrets that might change how she feels about the Golden Isle. Torn between two worlds, Ada will have to decide how far she is willing to go—and who she is willing to cross—to save her best friend.

Gripping, tense, and powerful, this will appeal to fans of *Immortal Dark* who are looking for the next great Black vampire read.

With competition this fierce, bodies are bound to hit the mat. . .

All Jonty has ever wanted is to lead her cheerleading team, The Exalted Ones, to win a NCA championship. Cheer is not just a sport, it's her legacy. Her mother cheered for T.E.O. before she died, and Jonty would do anything to snatch the crown and honor her mother's memory. This year she has a real shot, finally beating her rival Tommie and becoming the team captain.

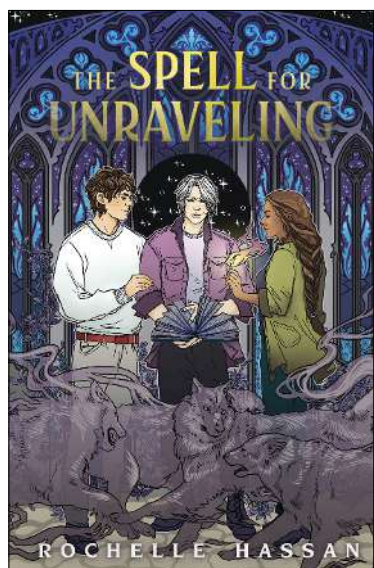

Boarding school senior Keziah is very familiar with the concept of ghosts—after all, a sleep paralysis demon has been her closest companion for the last few years. And she's, unfortunately, also all too familiar with the concept of ghosting, considering the string of dates that end up blocking her number with no explanation. Which isn't helping her quest to secure a date for the Homecoming dance and guarantee a win as Homecoming queen or princess at her all-girls school. 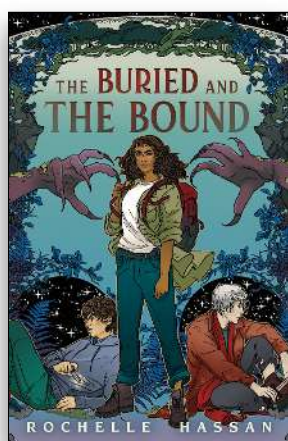

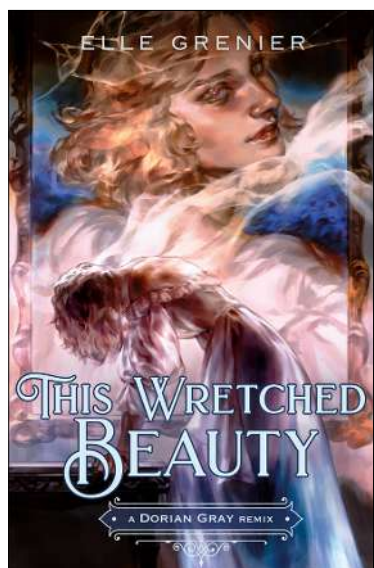

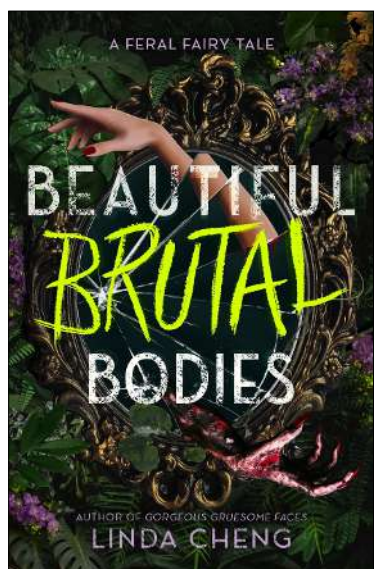
A transfem aristocrat tumbles down a treacherous path in this suspenseful YA remix of *The Picture of Dorian Gray*, the latest addition to the Remixed Classics series.

London, 1867. Dorian Gray is the heir to a title and their family's estate, but they've never been given the chance to decide if that's actually what they want out of life. Then one night they sneak out and meet a talented young painter named Basil, who immediately recognizes Dorian as his new muse. Dorian is struck by the beauty and depth that Basil paints into their likeness—and they dare to hope there might be more to life than being their grandfather's perfect, empty-headed heir.

Dorian is further elated when Basil introduces them to the world of molly houses and drag performers. But Dorian's rosy outlook is shattered when a police investigation into Dorian's favorite performer, Sybil Vane, implicates them in "indecent" activities. Terrified of their grandfather's wrath, Dorian offers evidence against Sybil in a panic, and immediately hates themselves for turning on a friend. Finally breaking free of their grandfather's control, Dorian flees London, but the damage has been done.

As Dorian falls into a terrible downward spiral of self-loathing, something strange happens—Basil's portrait of them begins to change. Their smile becomes a little sharper, the glint in their eyes a little colder. Dorian will have to choose—embrace the wickedness within, or dare to try for something far more fragile and dangerous: a life of their own.

Full of skin-crawling surprises and sultry romance, this standalone follows a reclusive pop-star and her alluring bodyguard who must uncover the occult secrets of their past and escape from a deadly island.

Tian is one of the biggest pop stars in the world, known for her hypnotic vocals and ethereal looks. But behind the glamorous façade is a disturbing truth: Raised in an isolated mansion, Tian is a prisoner in her own life.

Liya is Tian's childhood friend and her only close companion, tasked with protecting Tian at all costs. But hidden beneath Liya's beautiful human exterior is a beastly secret: her teeth are far too sharp, and her appetite much too ferocious.

When several fans mysteriously suffer fatal injuries while watching her livestream, Tian, along with Liya, are sent to a spiritual healing retreat on a remote island in the South China Seas. 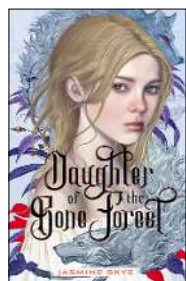

This enthralling murder mystery follows Ulá Dominguez, a Bribri-American teenager, searching for the truth behind her land-activist father's mysterious death on their Native territory in Costa Rica. Ulá and her brother face off against illegal loggers, kidnappers, settlers, and the Costa Rican government while hunting for clues. Their only ally is a local journalist, who may be in danger himself.

Inspired by real-world missing, dead, and attacked Indigenous activists, award-winning author Ari Tison writes her first novel in prose and pushes the envelope yet again by pulling together a propulsive story full of grief, environmental justice, and the fight for retribution that will resonate with teen readers. Told in multiple points of view, the narrative also invokes the collective voice of Bribri ancestors "Together we see" is the literal translation of the Bribri phrase for "goodbye." Tison challenges the reader to sit with Ulá's grief, to acknowledge the cost of greed, and to ask themselves "How far would you go to protect your land?"

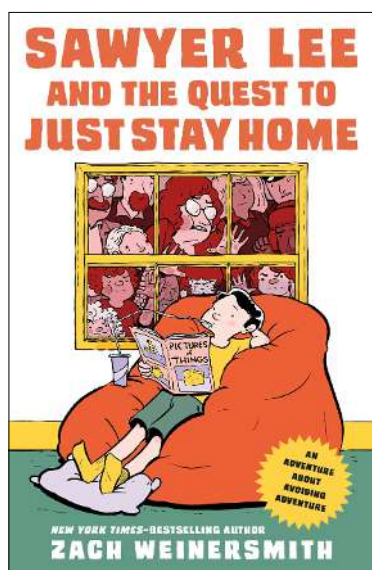

SAWYER LEE AND THE QUEST TO JUST STAY HOME by Zach Weinersmith

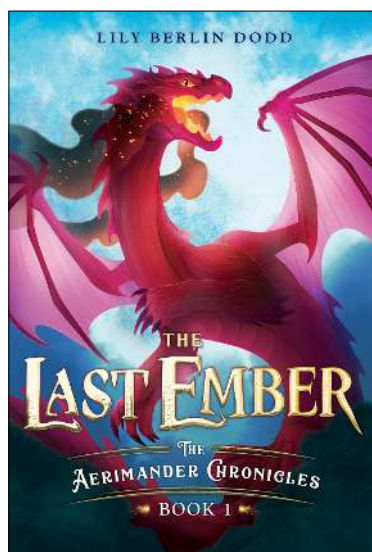

THE GINGHAMS by T. C. Kemper

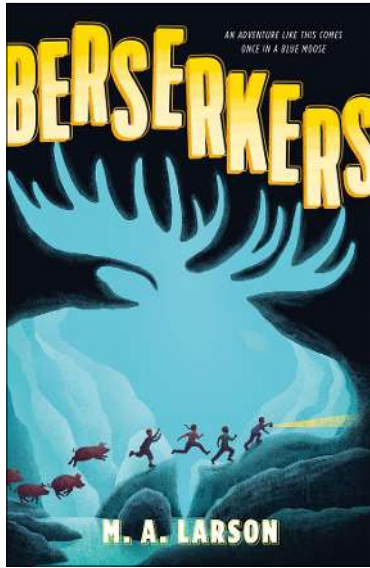

It takes place in a small town called North Ridge, Minnesota, which is a lot like any other small town in the Midwest except it has more subterranean caves and people named Olaf. (Also they eat hotdish, not casserole. Don't get it twisted.) The main character is a kid named Danny Hall, who goes on a hunt with his friends to find their lost social studies teacher and Viking treasure, within the said caves.

But this book ALSO includes an evil descendant of a Spanish conquistador and his school principal sidekick who are racing to beat the kids to the treasure. 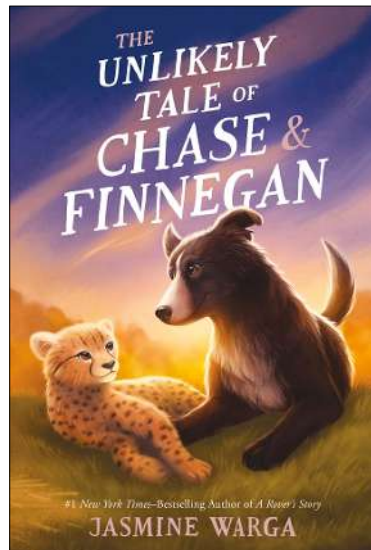

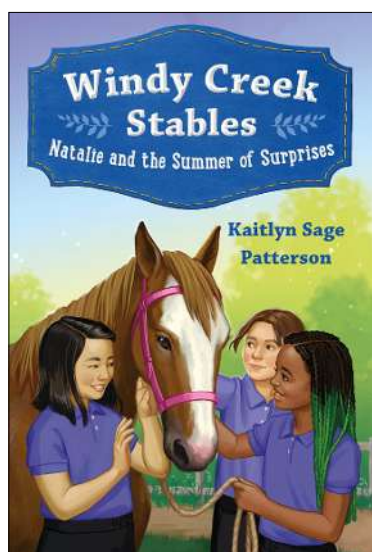

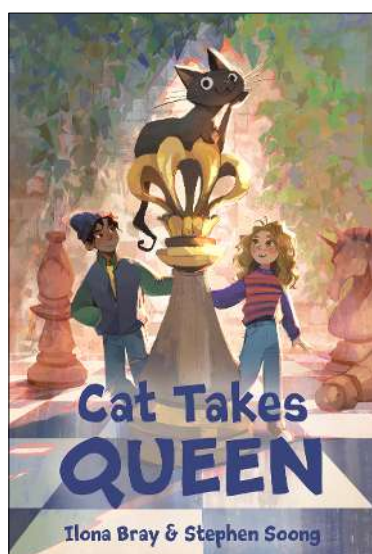
In *Natalie and the Summer of Surprises*, Natalie has to decide if she can become the horse girl her mom has always wanted her to be.

Natalie is a city kid who loves indoor activities like reading and watching movies. So spending the summer stuck at her mom's riding school in nowhere, Virginia is the worst idea she's ever heard. But eleven-year-olds don't get to make the rules, which is why Natalie is at Windy Creek with a parent she barely knows and a bunch of horses she couldn't care less about.

Things go from bad to worse when Natalie realizes her mother actually expects her to *ride*. Windy Creek is full of horse-crazy kids Natalie has nothing in common with, and her mom clearly wishes she had any of them for a daughter instead. Natalie would give anything to get out of there and go back to the city, and even more than that, she wishes her mom didn't expect her to be someone she's clearly not.

With no choice *but* to learn to ride, Natalie begrudgingly participates in Windy Creek's summer horse camp alongside pretty, stuck up Harper, who is a million times better with horses than Natalie is and won't let her forget it, and energetic and fun Presley, who is at least happy to be Natalie's friend. 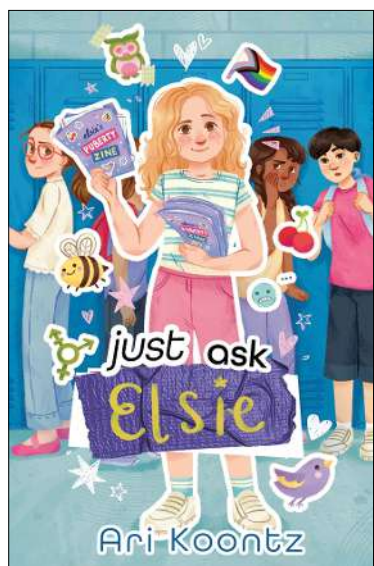

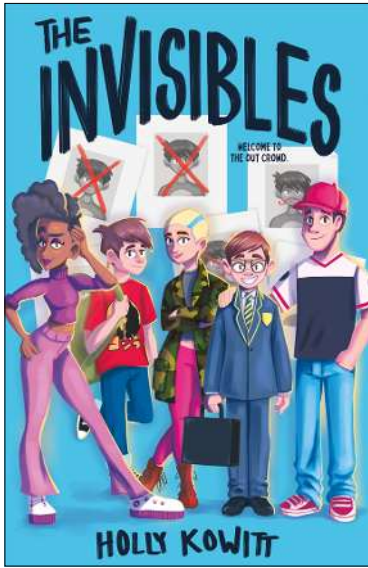

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***THE BLUE DRESS* by Rebecca Morrison**

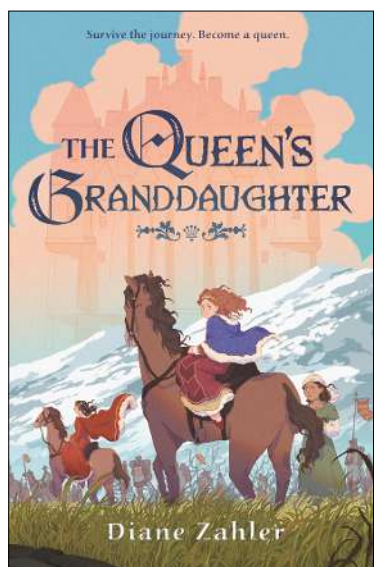
